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









### The ELT system

Installation with NAV-ELT interface (CS-144)

- → ELT = Emergency Locator Transmitter
  - → Transmit on 1, 2 or 3 frequencies :
    - → 121.5 MHz
    - → 243 MHz
    - → 406.02x MHz
  - →121.5/243MHz are called "Homing" frequencies.

Analog audio signal

→ 406 MHz burst

Digital message containing identification data Can contain position data with optional NAV-ELT interface

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








### **DIN12 Connector and dongles**





**Programming dongle A320** 



- A DIN12 connector is used to connect the ELT to the RCP.
- This connector can include a Serial Memory Module (SMM) containing the coding information of the ELT It is called a "Programming Dongle"
- In fixed installation (AF, AP...) the dongle is permanently attached to the ELT side of the RCP cable.
- In survival installation (AS, Survival...) the dongle can be stored in the mounting bracket or in the carry-off bag.
- To program an ELT from a dongle, connect the dongle to the ELT, then switch to ARM. The coding information is transferred from the dongle to the ELT
- Once the ELT is programmed, if the dongle is removed, the ELT keeps the coding information previously downloaded from the dongle
- To restore an ELT back to factory programming (test protocol), use a maintenance dongle.

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


### **ELT-NAV Interface Kit**

CS144-RS RS-232 or RS422 interface CS144-A **ARINC 429 interface** 

- → A programming dongle is mandatory when using the CS144.
- The CS144 get the identification of the aircraft from the dongle (short message)
- The CS144 get the position of the aircraft from the aircraft navigation equipment
- The CS144 combines the identification and the position to build a long message.
- → The long message is transmitted to the ELT via the ELT DIN12 connector.

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




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### **Distress Message Processing**



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### Aircraft identification

- → Thanks to a shared database, SAR\* headquarters know the type of aircraft in distress as well as the color of the fuselage, the number of passengers...
- → Knowing who is transmitting brings an efficient solution to false alarms
- → KANNAD company holds a database of its beacons that can be used as a backup of the "official" database



### **Precise pinpointing**

→ Thanks to an Ultra-Stable signal, the COSPAS-SARSAT satellites can pinpoint a 406Mhz ELT by doppler effect within 2 Nautical Miles (according to COSPAS-SARSAT spec).

- → Test carried out with KANNAD ELTs show an accuracy better than 500 meters
- → The position of the aircraft can be added in the "long" digital message with an accuracy of 4" (125 meters). A special "NAV-ELT" interface is required (CS144).



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




#### **COSPAS-SARSAT satellites**

The COSPAS-SARSAT alerting system is based on two types of satellites:

- ① LEOSAR (Low Earth Orbiting Search And Rescue Satellites)
- ② GEOSAR (Geostationary Earth Orbiting Search And Rescue Satellites)














#### **LEOSAR satellites**



- Polar orbiting satellites
- → 5 satellites
- → Altitude = 850 km
- → Revolution period = 100 minutes
- · Depends on satellite pass (max waiting time in Europe = 50 minutes, on the equator = 2 hours, duration 15 minutes)
- Ambiguity of the Doppler positioning (one position East and one position West of the satellite track)





- · Low altitude (high link margin)
- Global coverage (including the poles)
- Visible from any place in the world (even behind a tall mountain...)
- 406 MHz signal processed by the satellite (Recording)
- Location of the transmitter (Doppler effect)
- 121,5 MHz repeater (until 2009)

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







## **GEOSAR** satellites

- Geostationary satellites
- 4 satellites
- → Altitude = 36 000 km (over the equator)



- Can be hidden by tall obstacles (ex North of a tall mountain...)
- Unable to determine the location of a transmitter (No Doppler effect) = identification but no position (except if the ELT transmits its position)






- Always visible (within the coverage area)
- Quasi global coverage (except the poles)
- 406 MHz signal repeater
- Immediate alert (less than 5 minutes)



## Perfect satellite complementarity



COSPAS-SARSAT benefits from the combination of both satellite systems



- Always visible (within the coverage area)
- Nearly global coverage (except the poles)
- 406 MHz signal repeater
- Immediate alert (less than 5 minutes)



- · Low altitude (high link margin)
- Global coverage (even the poles)
- Will be visible from any place on the world (even North of a tall mountain...)
- 406 MHz signal processed by the satellite (Recording)
- Can determine the location of a transmitter (Doppler effect)

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









## Transmission diagram (all ELTs but AF-Compact)





## Transmission diagram (Kannad 406 AF-Compact)



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








## Structure of the digital message (406MHz burst)



- Short message (No ELT-NAV) = 112 bits = 28 hexadecimal chars.
  - Example of short message : FF FE 2F 4C 93 24 97 38 0B A6 06 F1 25 90
- Long message (with ELT-NAV) = 144 bits = 36 hexadecimal chars.
  - Example of long message : FF FE 2F CC 93 24 97 38 0B A6 05 09 86 80 23 01 1E D3
- In short or long message, the 60 identification bits can be noted as 15 hexadecimal characters called 15 Hex ID.
  - ⇒ Example of 15 Hex ID: 9926492E70174C0 

    This is a unique identifier for every single ELT in the world.



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#### Information encoded in the ELT

The coding protocol defines the type of information encoded in the "Identification" field of the digital message

- → 4 possible types of coding when ELT installed :
  - → Protocols which identify the aircraft
    - Tail number (T/N)
    - **□ ICAO 24bit address (ICAO)**
  - → Protocols which identify the ELT itself
    - ⇒ Unique serial number (S/N)
    - ⇒ Aircraft Operator Designator + serialised number (AOD)
- → 1 special type for ELTs not on board (i.e. "Maintenance Code" = MN)
  - → Details in document C/S G.005 http://www.cospas-sarsat.org/Documents/gDocs.htm

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## Coding protocol: Aircraft registration marking

- also called T/N (tail number) protocol -
- → The ELT will transmit the Aircraft Registration marking (or Tail Number, T/N) "in clear", without the dash (-)
- → Any aircraft registry is based on this number
- Main advantage: no database needed
- → This type of code shall be selected if no relevant Sarsat Point of Contact or no clear information about accepted coding protocols is available.
- → When possible (Tail Number on only 5 digits), two ELTs installed on the same aircraft will be distinguished by their rank on board by adding a slash "/" before the rank of the ELT "FBXRV/1" fixed ELT
  - "FBXRV/2" first survival
- → This coding protocol will also include the country code
  - → Example of identifier: FBXRV/1, HBA6D/1, GCGAB/2, N86173



#### Coding protocol: Aircraft 24 bit address - also called ICAO 24 bit address protocol -

- → Unique number issued by the relevant Civil Aviation Authority
- → Also used to encode Mode S transponders or TCAS systems
- → International aircraft registry based on this number (ICAO)
- → Coded on 24 bits, noted in Hexadecimal notation
- → This coding protocol will also include the country code, the TAC\*, and the rank on board (from 0 to 63)

→ Example of identifier : A379B1

\*TAC = Type Approval Certificate from Cospas-Sarsat, selected from a drop down menu in the programming software

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### **Coding protocol: Unique Serial Number**

1/2

- → Requires a specific database to link the serialised number with the A/C identification
- If ELT changes
  - no re-programming needed
  - but registration update with the relevant SPOC\* is required.
- → 2 "sub-types" depending on who gives the serialised number (COSPAS-SARSAT, ELT manufacturer, Country authority)
  - Serial number assigned by beacon manufacturer (CSN)
  - Serialised number issued by country authorities

→ Example of identifier: 327634, 31, 453720

<sup>\*</sup>SPOC = Sarsat Point Of Contact



#### **Coding protocol: Unique Serial Number** 2/2

- → Serial number assigned by beacon manufacturer (CSN)
  - Each Kannad ELT or Dongle has its own CSN.
  - CSN is a 6 digit number starting with a 3
  - This number is written on the "Identification label" of the ELT or the Dongle.
- → Serialised Number issued by country authorities
  - The programmer shall contact KANNAD or the local COSPAS-SARSAT authorities to obtain a number before programming
  - This number is issued only if "registration form" is duly completed (to ensure registration)

These coding protocols will also include the country code and usually include the TAC\*

\*TAC = Type Approval Certificate from Cospas-Sarsat, selected from a drop down menu in the programming software

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### **Coding protocol: Aircraft Operator Designator**

- → Enables an airlines to manage its fleet with a database to link the S/N with the A/C
- → As this database is handled by the airline:
  - no need to update registration with SPOC
  - no need to re-program ELT
  - but H24 contact required
- → Code composed of the "three letter aircraft operator designator" + serial number from 0001 to 4096 (issued by airline)
- → NB: when using a CS144 ELT-NAV interface, the serial number must be from 001 to 511

→ Example of identifier: AFR 0027, AAL0153



#### **Maintenance code (test protocol)**

- → Agreement between KANNAD and FMCC (French Mission Control Centre)
- FI Ts coded with
  - Country code "France" 227
  - Test protocol
  - ⇒ Identifier = "SI" plus the 5 last digits of the CSN or "K" plus the 6 digits of the CSN (since mid 2008)
- → Recognised by COSPAS-SARSAT as "ELT not on board"
- → To program an ELT with a "Maintenance code", use function "ELT Maintenance Code Programming" in Winprog software or connect a "Maintenance Dongle" and switch ELT to "ARM".
- → When ELT programmed with a "Maintenance code", ELT self-test result is 3+4 flashes.

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#### Which protocol to select?

- → Depends on the country of registration of the aircraft
- → Document C/S G.005 (§6.2) asks the "manufacturer or distributor" of a 406 MHz beacon to determine the identity of administration authorising its use (SPOC) and to comply with administration registration requirements.



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

## How to get the information from the operator?

- → A Programming Data Sheet (PDS) must be filled in for each programming of an ELT or a Dongle.
- → If the ELT will be programmed by a dongle, the PDS apply to the Dongle.
- Programming Data Sheet (PDS) must be completed by the operator to get the relevant information on the aircraft registration and operational point of contact.

Lower part is to be completed by the programmer and must be sent to KANNAD

- Programming Data Sheet is available :
  - On KANNAD download site
  - In Winprog, Menu "Misc"
  - Upon request to KANNAD Customer Support

#### Important note:

The PDS apply to any device, either Dongle or ELT, which is programmed by the PR550 or PR600

When programming a Dongle, the PDS must be filled in the same way as for an ELT.

- → To install a new ELT, select option "Installation"
- → To remove an ELT, select "Removal"
- → Unless A/C is equipped with programming dongle, 2 PDS must be completed when replacing an ELT (1 with "Removal", the other with "Installation")
- → The ELT needs to be reprogrammed if A/C changes country of registration (select "Re-coding")
- Any change of ownership must be registered (select "New owner")



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#### Aircraft

Type of aircraft (use ICAO abbreviation)	A319

- → This information is useful to organise the Search and **Rescue Operation**
- → MSN (Mainframe Serial Number) is required to deliver ELT to an Aircraft Manufacturer. This number is copied on the ELT identification label

- This information is mandatory. It is either programmed into the ELT or registered with both SPOC and KANNAD
- → The 24 bit address is available from the Civil Aviation Authority and must be converted in Hexadecimal format. 1101 1111 0010 1100 0011 0001 = DF2C31

- → Complete the exact type of ELT to be installed. Ex: KANNAD 406 AP or KANNAD 406 AS ...
- → The rank of the ELT must be specified if other ELTs are installed on board
  - ⊃ T/N protocol : rank 1 = automatic ELT, rank 2 = first survival ELT, etc...
  - ⇒ 24-bit address protocol : rank 0 = first ELT, rank 1 = second ELT, etc...
- → The ELT installation option must be specified by the aircraft operator as this information will enable to determine whether the ELT or the DONGLE contains the code.

- → Information usually added by the programmer (found on the equipment's name plate)
  - The ELT or Dongle CSN is a 6 digit number between 300000 and 399999 The CSN is software encoded in the PCB board (Read-Only)
- → It must be provided by the aircraft operator in case of ELT removal
- → The S/N is a production stamp. Not used for programming. Given for information only

- → Information usually added by the programmer
- → Examples of Identification numbers (depending on the identification protocol):
  - ⇒ FBXRV/1, CFEYS/1 (T/N protocol)
  - 3A7C2F (24-bit address protocol)
  - ⇒ AFR 0783 (AOD protocol)
  - 322742 (Serial protocol)
- → The Identification code (15 HEX ID) is computed by the Kannad Winprog software. It is a "key information" within the COSPAS-SARSAT system. This number is required to complete any "registration form".

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## **Commissioning**

- → Before installation on board an aircraft, the operator must ensure that the ELT is programmed (self-test OK) and registered with the relevant COSPAS-SARSAT authorities.
- → The PR600 equipment is designed to program either the ELT or a Programming Dongle.
- → In case of installation with a programming dongle the programming is done automatically when the ELT is switched to ARM.
- → The programming dongle has to be programmed once. It has to be reprogrammed only in case of a change of registration.







### **Kannad Winprog setup**

Note: Kannad Winprog V2 runs on Windows 98SE, Windows 2000 and Windows XP. However, PR600 drivers are not supported by KANNAD for Windows 98SE

#### → Installation

- If the Kannad Winprog CD doesn't autorun, launch "Setup.exe"
- ⇒ After the "Installshield Wizard Completed" screen, wait for the "FTDI Drivers" successfully installed" screen

#### Initial Setup

- Connect your programming kit to the PC. When plugging a PR600 for the first time, a "New Hardware found" wizard may pop-up for a few seconds.
- Launch Kannad Winprog from the icon in the Start menu
- ⇒ Fill in the "User Name" and "Identifier" fields with the code delivered by Kannad
- ⇒ A second setup screen asks you to choose either PR550 or PR600, and to select the appropriate COM port.
- ⇒ PR600 is using a *virtual COM port*, usually the last one from the list.

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








# **National Registration form**





### Step-by-step programming procedure

- Verify that PDS is complete
- → Double-check if the aircraft is equipped with a programming dongle. If so, the Dongle must be programmed, not the ELT.
- → According to country of registration, check Country Code and protocol to be used (see COSPAS-SARSAT web-site)
- → Create Coding Sheet
- → Program ELT or DONGLE (transfer data from PC to ELT or DONGLE)
- Complete log book (ELT only)
- → Complete label (ELT or DONGLE)
- → Print two "Coding Sheets" (one for KANNAD and one for the Operator)
- Complete lower part of the PDS
- → Download, print and prefill the relevant "Registration Form" (if applicable)
- → Deliver the relevant document to both KANNAD and the Operator (see Deliverables)
- → Inform the Operator that the ELT must be registered before first flight with the relevant authority (if applicable).
- → Any change (ELT replacement, change of ownership, change of A/C registration...) must be declared to KANNAD and the relevant authority.

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### **ELT** operational test

- → Connect the outside antenna or a 50 Ohms load to J2
- Connect the DIN 12 connector (or dongle) to J1
- Switch the ELT from OFF to ARM
- → The buzzer operates during the whole self-test procedure, after a few seconds the LED displays the result.
- → Check that the Self-Test result is OK (one long flash).
- → Without dongle, if the test result is 3+4 flashes, the ELT must be removed and programmed with the PR600
- → With a dongle, if the test result is 3+4 flashes, the dongle must be removed and programmed with the PR600
- → Do not switch the ELT to "ON" position at any any time, unless a real emergency case.



Why?

# **ELT** exchange (with Programming Dongle)

- Connect the outside antenna or a 50 Ohms load to J2
- Switch the ELT from OFF to ARM.
- → Check that the Self-Test fails (3+4 flashes)
- → If not, connect a maintenance dongle to J1:
  - Switch the ELT from OFF to ARM,
  - → Check that the Self-Test fails (3+4 flashes),
  - → Remove the maintenance dongle from J1.
- Connect the "Programming Dongle" to J1
- Switch the ELT from OFF to ARM:
- → The buzzer operates during the whole self-test procedure, after a few seconds the LED displays the result.
- → Check that the Self-Test result is OK (one long flash).
- → Do not switch the ELT to "ON" position at any any time, unless a real emergency case.

Tip: before programming an ELT from a dongle, it's mandatory to ensure that the ELT is not programmed yet (maintenance code = 3+4 flashes).

This is to ensure that the dongle is OK:

- If the dongle is defective, the ELT will keep its previous coding:
  - If the ELT was not programmed (3+4 flashes) it will continue to display 3+4 flashes → Self-Test Failed = dongle failure detected
  - If the ELT was programmed from a previous aircraft (One long flash) it will continue to display one long flash. → Self test OK = dongle failure NOT detected.
- If the dongle is correct, the ELT will get the new coding from the dongle.
  - If the ELT was not programmed (3+4 flashes) it will then display one long flash → Self-Test OK = programming done.

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### RCP operational test

→ Check correct operation of RCP LED and external buzzer by switching ELT and RCP as described in the sequential procedure hereunder (with ELT switch in position "ARM").

Sequence	RCP Switch	Result
1	TEST/RESET then back to ARMED (neutral)	Self-test: ELT and RCP LEDs flashing + uninterrupted buzzer activation (max. duration 5 seconds)[15 seconds for AF-Compact)
2	ON	ELT transmission: ELT and RCP LEDs flashing + uninterrupted buzzer activation.
		IMPORTANT: do not operate for more than 30 seconds
3	ARMED (neutral)	ELT transmission goes on.
4	TEST/RESET then back to ARMED (neutral)	ELT transmission stops.

<sup>\*</sup> Given for information: the ELT should not be switched to "ON", unless a real emergency case.



# 406 MHz transmission test (optional)





- → This test must be carried out with a COSPAS-SARSAT decoder (SARTECH ARG5410 or BT100AV triple for exemple).
- → Perform self-test (Press RESET and TEST on the RCP or switch ELT from OFF to ARM).
- → Check with decoder that, except for the 5th and the 6th digits, the decoded message is identical to the programmed message.
- → The message transmitted during self-test sequence always begins with FF



FE D0 whereas a "real" message begins with FF FE 2F.

Example of message programmed in ELT as sent during self-test sequence :

FF FE 2F 53 C3 24 97 38 0B A6 0F D0 F5 20

Example of same message decoded by Cospas-Sarsat decoder:

FF FE D0 53 C3 24 97 38 0B A6 0F D0 F5 20

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# 121.5 MHz transmission test (optional)

- → IMPORTANT: this test must only be carried out between H and H+5 minutes.
- Do not exceed 30 seconds of transmission.
- → This test must be carried out with a VHF receiver (or BT100AVTriple).
- Tune VHF receiver to 121.5 MHz



- All ELTs but AF-Compact :
  - Start transmission: either on ELT « ON » position, or on the RCP « ON » position.
  - Listen to the 121.5 MHz "sweep tone",
  - Stop transmission: either on ELT: « OFF » position or on the RCP « Test/Reset »
- Kannad 406AF-Compact
  - Perform a self-test: either on ELT to "ARM" position, or on the RCP « Test/Reset »
  - Listen to the 121.5 MHz "sweep tone" (duration: 2 or 3 sweeps)

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#### Scheduled maintenance

An ELT is an item of standby safety equipment → The ELT does not operate unless activated and must be fully operational when required

The only way to ensure good operation is to perform periodic checks:

- Operational check
- Functional check
- Battery replacement



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### **Operational check**

1/2



- → By whom : Pilot, Maintenance man
- → Where : From the cockpit (Remote Control Panel)



- One long flash = ELT OK
- Short flashes = Faulty ELT
- ⇒ 3 + 4 flashes = the ELT is not programmed

If the ELT is considered as a "NO GO" equipment according to national regulation, the flight must be cancelled...

- With what : No specific tool is required
- → How: sweep "tone test". Switch the ELT to "ON", listen to the sweep tone after the self-test. Switch the ELT to "OFF" (ELT) or "RESET" (RCP)

This test should be conducted between H and H + 5 minutes after warning the control tower. This test should never exceed 30 seconds.



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# **Operational check**

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→ It is possible to determine the type of failure by counting the number of flashes when performing the self-test:

3+1	LOW BATTERY VOLTAGE
3+2	LOW RF POWER
3+3	FAULTY VCO LOCKING
3+4	NO IDENTIFICATION PROGRAMMED

→ Each self-test consumes energy from the battery which has been designed to allow an average of one self test per month. Should self-tests be carried out more often than the maximum suggested, the battery life-time might be shorter than expected.

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### **Functional check**

1/2

- → When : As required by relevant regulations.
- → By whom : Authorized radio technician
- → Where : Authorized avionics shop (the ELT must be removed from the aircraft)
- → How: Refer to procedure "Test and Fault isolation" in the Component Maintenance Manual
- → The following parameters are to be tested:



- Self-test
- Battery voltage
- Communication with RCP
- **⇒** G-Switch
- Frequency / Power measurement on 121,5 MHz, 243 MHz and 406,025 MHz
- Programming and counters (if PR550/PR600)



#### **Functional check**

2/2



→ The tools required to perform Functional check are standard radio test equipment such as:

- Radio bench (optional if BT100AV triple or Aeroflex IFR4000 Opt. 1)
- Spectrum analyzer (optional if BT100AV triple or Aeroflex IFR4000 Opt. 1)
- Voltmeter
- Test models (connectors / resistors / switches)
- → The only specific tool is a COSPAS-SARSAT decoder ARG5410, BT100AV*triple*, or equivalent.

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### **Battery replacement**

1/2

- When : Battery replacement is mandatory
  - After more than 1 hour of real transmission (cumulated duration),
  - Prior to or on the battery expiration date.
  - ⇒ If the battery is discharged (self-test = 3+1 flashes and/or measured voltage lower than expected)
- By whom : Avionics technician
- → Where : Part 145 avionics shops (the ELT must be removed from the aircraft)
- → How : Refer to CMM level 2
- → All the necessary parts are available in a « Battery replacement kit » : KIT, BAT300 (P/N S1820516-99) for all ELTs but AF-Compact KIT, BAT200 (P/N S1840510-01) for 406AF-Compact

According to Kannad maintenance policy, no training is required for battery replacement, using CMM level 2.

The use of the CMM level 3, to be used for repair, is available only after a maintenance and repair training from Kannad.

Refer to Kannad Website or to our Service Letter "Kannad ELT maintenance policy" to know more about this policy.



# **Battery replacement**

2/2



→ The Battery Expiry Date has been determined 6,5 years from the Date of Manufacture of the battery pack. (6 years operation + 6 months manufacturing, storage, sale).

- Only original battery packs supplied by KANNAD can be installed.
- → KANNAD refuses all responsibility and invalidates all warranty should other battery packs be installed.



- → A functional check must be performed after battery replacement
- → As the ELT housing is opened, it must be tested for water-tightness after re-assembly. The ELT is immersed in hot water (60°C +/- 5°) for about 5 minutes. No air bubbles should escape.

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### Warranty policy

- → The standard warranty is two years from date of delivery
- Warranty is void in case of misuse.
  - ⇒ If it is determined that a 50 Ohms load (antenna or dummy load) has not be connected to the RF output while transmitting, the replacement of the output RF amplifier will not be covered by the warranty.
  - ⇒ If the seal is removed or damaged (housing opened by an unauthorized avionics shop), the warranty will not apply.
- The battery is never replaced under warranty except if it is determined that a failure of the PCB has discharged or damaged the battery.
- The equipment shall be sent to an authorized avionics shop with full capability to repair KANNAD ELTs.

**CAUTION**: A NFF (No Fault Found) charge will be billed to the customer if it is not possible to reproduce the failure in the shop. It is thus strongly recommended to describe as precisely as possible the conditions in which the failure appeared.
